


ROAD REDUCTION

As you've probably noticed, the county has resurfaced 2nd Street South between South Ivy Street and South Glebe Road. The county says it's taking advantage of the regularly scheduled pavement maintenance work to make a number of improvements after receiving complaints of high traffic speeds on 2nd Street S., where the posted 25 mph speed limit often gets ignored because of the wide, straight travel lanes:

- Travel lanes reduced from 15 feet to 11 feet in width;
- Addition of bicycle lanes between S. Glebe Road and S. Irving Street;
- Pedestrian ramps improved to current standards based on the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) throughout the project area;
- Addition of a marked and signed crosswalk with a new curb extension at S. Ivy Street.

NEIGHBORHOOD SPOTLIGHT: ARLINGTON CAREER CENTER/GOVERNOR'S CAREER AND TECHNICAL ACADEMY

Did you know that Arlington Heights is home to a key resource for the high-schoolers in your life? The Arlington Career Center at 816 S. Walter Reed Drive serves all high school students in the Arlington Public Schools, offering a wide range of Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs, academic options and dual-enrolled college courses through the Governor's Career & Technical Academy.

This year, one of the Center's Forensic students won first place in the Medical Math Exam, and the television production team was named state champion at the Skills USA competition, earning gold medals in Broadcast News Live, TV Production/Special Effects, TV Production/Cuts Only, and Pre-production/Radio Communications. Many other students were honored with scholarships and other recognitions at the Career Center's annual awards assembly this spring.

More importantly, many APS students who have successfully completed the CTE programs at the Career Center are now active in the workforce here in Arlington and throughout the nation. Career Center grads include electricians, EMT's, physicians, physical therapists, chefs, auto technicians, engineers, computer programmers and cosmetologists.

The Career Center prepares students to realize their potential in a changing technological society and provides enhanced opportunities in four areas: handson skills; industry certifications; college credit; and career experiences such as internships and client projects.

In addition, four full-day academic programs are also offered at the Center:

- The Academic Academy is an alternative to comprehensive high school for students in grades 10 through 12, as well as ninth grade students who have not yet completed the requisite coursework for admission to high school;
- The HILT (High Intensity Language Training) Institute is for older students (ages 16-21) who benefit more from a small and structured academic environment, integrated with a career and technical component:
- The EBCE (Experienced Based Career Education) Program combines academic instruction with un-


paid career exploration at work sites in the community; and

• The SWAT (Supported Work and Transition) Program is a community-based program for supported work experience as well as travel and independent living training for students.

This year, 180 students enrolled in one of four Health and Medical Programs, which include: Health and Medical Sciences; Pharmacy Technician; Physical Therapy/Sports Medicine Technology; and Emergency Medical Technician/Human Anatomy and Physiology. These programs are helping the Center to establish a Health and Medical Academy for those students considering a career in the field of medicine.

The Academy offers a Summer STEM Academy at the NOVA Alexandria campus for rising juniors and seniors. Students can earn from three to nine college credits in the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) fields – automotive (engines), cyber security, and architectural drafting. The topics change annually, depending upon student interest.

Enrichment classes are also offered on Saturdays



from October through March and during July to enhance the experience of Arlington's students in grades 3-12. In addition, the PRIME Internship Program offers students an opportunity to intern in the professional community for four weeks in the summer.

The Governor's Academy programs focus on



building relationships, relevance and rigor by providing opportunities for high-level, realworld projects and entrance into Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA). Once students are enrolled in NOVA (usually as high school juniors), they earn college credit through dual-enrolled courses. This gives them a leg up to the

post-secondary studies and pursuits.

Beginning in September, Arlington Mill High School daytime classes will be joining with their evening classes to fully co-locate at the Arlington Career Center. Arlington Mill High School is a countywide school of choice for students ages 16 and older who are completing their high school diploma. As a high school of enrollment, Arlington Mill awards its own diploma and is distinguished by offering courses required for a high school diploma on a semester basis. Classes operate in both the day and evening hours. Arlington Mill's diverse student population is focused on earning a high school diploma, while preparing for college, work, and the future. While completing high school requirements, students have a chance to take classes for dual-enrollment college credit, and the new Career Center location will now afford them added opportunities to complete CTE courses and additional college level dual-enrollment classes.

Finally, the Teen Parenting Program will also transition into the Career Center this fall. This program addresses the issues of adolescent pregnancy including educational needs and other related issues of our young parents, and the new location will expand these students' instructional opportunities.


Please take this opportunity to renew your AHCA membership. Residential memberships are \$20.00 per household; business memberships are \$25.

SUMMER SAFETY

Vacation time is here, and the Arlington County Police Department would like to remind you of some common-sense tips if you're going to be out of town:

- 1) Do not stop mail or newspaper Do you know who you are talking to when you notify your service providers? You wouldn't tell a stranger your address and then tell them you were going to be out of town for a week or two would you? Of course not! Have a trusted neighbor or friend come by and pick up the mail and newspaper.
- 2) While that friend or neighbor is at your home, have them move your car from time to time. Nothing screams "I am not home" louder than a car sitting in the same spot day after day with a thick coating of pollen collecting on it.
- 3) Have interior and exterior lights on timers and vary the time they turn on/off. Lowe's and Home Depot have various brands that are programmable by day and/or by week. You can also plug in your TV to the newer timers and have your TV turn on/off at prescribed times.
- 4) Tell a neighbor that you will be out of town and to keep an eye on your home. Have them report any-

- suspicious persons loitering around your home to the police especially if they see people in the home or coming from it.
- 5) When on vacation we tend to let our guard down. Be wary of carrying large amounts of cash/use of ATM. Use your credit card for purchases if you can, and consider having a specific credit card for purchases separate from your debit/bank card, which is tied to your bank account. If you make purchases on your debit card you are relying on your bank's good will to reimburse you. This is sound advice not only for vacation travel but for everyday purchases.
- 6) At hotels, NEVER leave valuables in your room. Use the room safe if there is one or check in valuables with the manager in the hotel safe.
